Central Texas Region

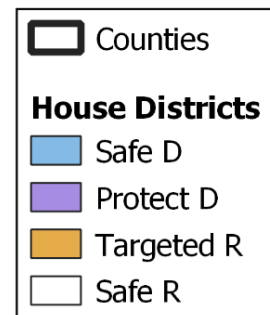
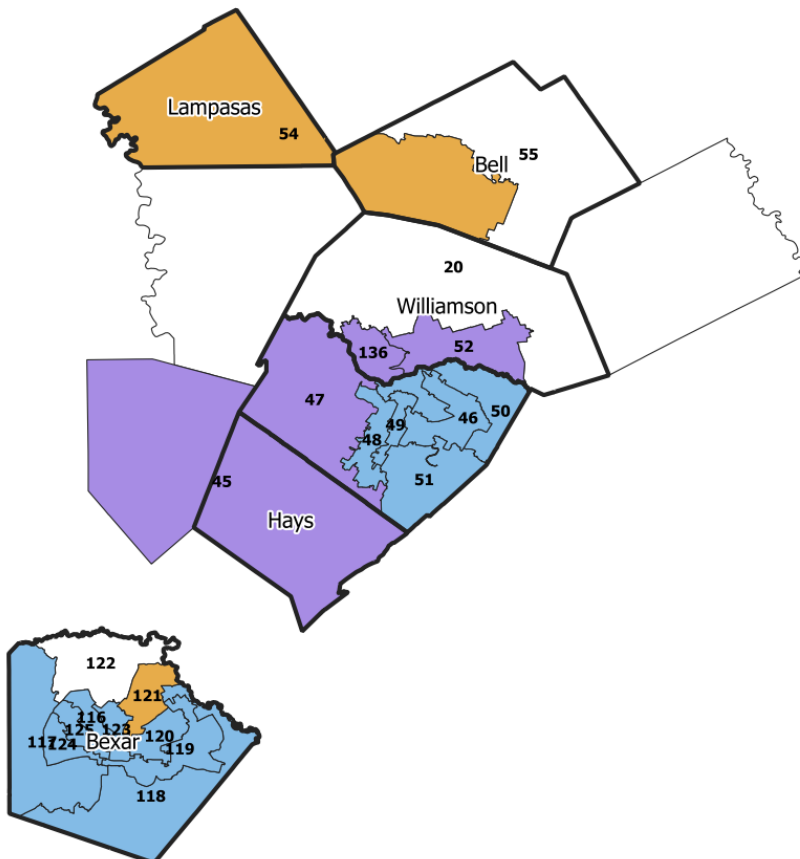
A Democratic Texas State House majority and election of a Democratic House Speaker is within reach in 2020. Central Texas is a key region in the battle for a new majority. Four of the 12 competitive Democratic-held seats are in Central Texas and two of 17 targeted Republican-held seats are in the region.

Texas will gain at least 2 and probably 3 new congressional seats after the 2020 census. A Democratic majority in the House can block adoption of a Republican-gerrymandered congressional map and force new congressional lines to be drawn by the federal courts.

Badly needed partisan balance can be brought to the Texas Legislature for the first time in a generation. With a House majority, Democrats can move beyond an opposition only strategy and become pro-active on healthcare, education, environment, employment rights, economic growth, and local control to adopt policies that work for all Texans.

Similarly, Democrats can negotiate new state legislative district lines from a position of strength, leveraging to avoid maps being drawn by the Legislative Redistricting Board and/or building the legal record needed to block racially gerrymandered State House and State Senate districts.
